

	Sites 209, 043,080,188 are not suitable for development.		
	There are already significant safety issues with the crossroads adjacent to		

these areas and an increase in vehicle movements here as a result of new housing would exacerbate the problem. The sites are very rural and there

	neighbouring village, so residents are more likely to use conventional forms of transport because of distance and safety issues. Site 209 is definitely Green Belt and so should not be released for new housing. Development on the other part of this field (for the GP surgery) was only allowed due to the "special circumstances" of it being a healthcare facility.
