I am disappointed to note that your Draft Site Assessment contains some inaccuracies that ought to be addressed and amended. Access to Road: Not the best; but certainly no worse than St Margaret's Church. Access to Post Office: Within 200 yards in Doddinghurst Road. Consultation/Public Views: Parish Council Petition – I would like this to be discounted on the basis that the Petition was organised by the Chairman of the Parish Council as a 'knee jerk' reaction and biased. It was dated 31 st May, 2011 and distributed – but not verified by the Parish Council until the 2 nd June, 2011 (see Parish minutes). I believe that the Parish Council were of the opinion that they were having a social housing estate similar to 'Outings Lane' thrust upon the village and based their Petition accordingly. There was no consultation with the public and the public were led to tick the boxes to suit the council's aims. I addressed the Parish Council at a Public Meeting on 7 th July, 2011 (see copy of attached statement) and copies of Brentwood Gazette articles 29 th June and 13 th July, 2011 attached. Subsequently, I have had three parishioner couples requesting to be considered for this 'retirement' development. |

Campaign letter highlights concerns

A GRANDFATHER is defending his vision for a "retirement village" in his leafy parish after it received a backlash of criticism through a letter campaign.

Dave Parrott claims to be shocked by the reaction from fellow villagers in Doddinghurst after he proposed a 2.6-acre plot of land near St Margaret's Church, in Doddinghurst Road, for development under Brentwood's new Local Development Plan.

It is just one of 44 sites put forward for housing as landowners look to cash in on plans to reaet 3,400 homes by 2031.

As for the letter campaign, Mr Parrott, who has lived in the vil-lage for 35 years, questioned why he was never approached before they were sent out.

He points out it would be many years before this development would ever come to fruition under the Local Development Plan.

He said: "There are many high and misguided feelings running through the village, not helped by the letter sent to all residents by the parish council intimating this will cause severe strain on the schools, water system, sewerage farm and traffic."

Councillor Debble Dicker, the parish council chairman, confirmed they had sent out the letters and had received plenty of reaction since – all against the proposal.

Villager hits out at 'bias' against plan for retirees

A GRANDFATHER has publicly defended his vision to build a "retirement village" but admits it may never happen within his life-time.

Dave Parreit passionately defended putting forward a 2-6-acreplot of land mear St. Margaret's Church, in Doddinghurst Road, for development under Brentwood's Local Development Plan. At a meeting of Doddinghurst Parish Council on Thursday, the villager of 35 years also hit out at the parish council during an at thme sheated debate, accusing them of turning villagers against his proposal.

Mr Parrott said he should have been approached before the letters were ever sent out and questioned the "quality" status of the parish council.

Council chairman, Cilr Debbie Dicker, defended the decision to send out the letter and insisted they were never trying to cause panic.
